






### REVIEW:


During the sermon this week we looked at the story of Joseph in Genesis chapter 50. Take a moment and ask group members to communicate the essence of the sermon in one sentence.




### ASK THIS:


Can you think of a story of significant betrayal that sticks out in your mind? What were the circumstances? What makes the betrayal worse than other stories?

*Leader Tip: If the group stalls and cannot think of any, use these: Jacob and Essau, Julius Cesear and Brutus, Judas and Jesus, Benedict Arnold, Aarron Burr*

## THE TEXT: WHAT DOES IT MEAN FOR ME?



### DO THIS:

Split up into 3 groups. Assign each group a passage and then give them about 10 minutes to read through the passage and then report back to the group 1) explain the scenario 2) explain the betrayal 3) explain the response of the victim.

Passages: Judges 16:1-31, 2 Samuel 13:1-22, Daniel 6:1-24

*Leader Tip: When the groups report back, make sure they communicate the response of the victim. The victim's response in all of these passages will vary. Consider using this as a transitional sentence to get into the text "As we can see, there are many different responses that people have when they have been betrayed. Scripture records these responses, which tells us there is something we can learn from them. However our lesson today focus's on honoring God through our response in **our own storms of life.**"*

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**ASK THIS:**

Someone please read Genesis 50:19-21

1. In verse 19 Joseph makes the point that it is not his place to decide who receives grace and forgiveness.
  - a. For group members that have experienced betrayal, how difficult do you believe it was for Joseph to say this to his brothers?
  
2. Joseph had the power to seek complete retribution for the acts his brothers committed against him, yet he chose to have a different response. How do you view Joseph's perspective? Too pious? Too grace-filled? Just right? Why?
  
3. In verse 20 Joseph says to his brothers "God meant it (*their evil acts towards him*) for good to bring about the present result-the survival of many people". However at this point in the story Joseph had the benefit of knowing that his trials in Egypt would save many people since God told him personally of the coming famine. Yet often times our circumstances, while they are not any easier, are not as straightforward.
  - a. In your own circumstances how do you navigate the struggle of perspective since many times seeing God at work is difficult until months or years later?
  - b. What are some perspectives you have employed to help you navigate your way through the storm? What perspective did you have?
  
4. A surprising aspect to Joseph's response to his brothers, more so than his declaration to not condemn them, is found in verse 21b "So he comforted them and spoke kindly to them."
  - a. Does verse 21b surprise you at all? Which part? What about it surprises you?
  - b. In light of the New Testament's teaching on forgiveness what do you believe God is communicating to us regarding how Joseph responded to his brothers?

*Leader Tip: Reinforce the sermon. We extend grace because grace was extended to us. We accept people as they are because Jesus accepted us as we were. We put people's needs first because Jesus put our needs first.*

5. Recall past storms in your life and your response to those storms. Knowing how God desires for us as Christ-followers to respond, can you identify some storms where your response didn't honor God? What happened? If you could have a do-over how specifically might you change your response?
  
6. Theologians have argued for many years over why exactly storms in life overtake us, however the fact is despite all of the debating people still are betrayed, catastrophe still strikes, and grief is all too real.
  - a. If you had the opportunity, how would you communicate to a person in the midst of a storm a way to navigate safely through their storm? What Scripture(s) would you recommend? Why those? What promises of God would you share? What stories of your own could you pass along?
